



BANBURY HARRIERS ATHLETIC CLUB

Banbury Harriers founded in 1879, was not only a running club but also catered for rugby football and cricket.

In March 1922, the Club borrowed sufficient money to purchase the land known as Harriers Ground for £850. Unfortunately funds ran out and the bank had to be paid off. The Education Authority purchased the land in the 1930s.

Following the Second World War the Club's fortunes declined even further and during the 50s and 60s the Club rose and fell with monotonous regularity. A letter dated 1966 indicates that the Club had folded for three years but in 1970 the Club was once again revived.

In 1975 the first 5 mile road race (The Banbury 5) was staged by the Club. Since then the Club has promoted the AP20 and the Don Sullivan 10 road races; the Eric Andrews Memorial Cross Country race and the Track and Field Open Meeting. The Club has also been host to league fixtures in the Heart of England League, Southern Women's League, Men's Southern League and Chiltern League Cross Country among others.

A tremendous achievement for a Club which in 1978 has only 50 members. The growth since then has been tremendous, at the moment the Club has over 250 active members, and is always looking for more.

No need to be an Ovett, Coe, Cathy Cook or Tessa Sanderson, just two legs and an interest in athletics. Anyone from the age of 10 is welcome and if you feel you can't run, the Club is in great need of helpers. People to coach, judge track, field and cross country events, and time keeping, the Club will arrange training in all these pastimes. If you are interested please contact the Club Secretary John Rollard (Banbury 52895) or George Hall, Coaching Secretary (Banbury 59873). Alternatively come along any Wednesday evening (in summer to the Club house, at the rear of Blessed George Napier School, Addison Road; in winter Drayton School gymnasium at 7 pm)

As a thriving athletic club the one basic necessity is now a track. The present Banbury School track falls far short of the standard required and the Club has been banned from hosting fixtures in one league to to this reason. There has been talk of a synthetic track since 1978 but it all ends in talk. If the Club is to grow even more and really achieve greatness we must have a track for both training and competition.



Toughest in the country

One of the toughest courses in the country — that was the verdict of the winner of Ban-

bury's first marathon on Sunday.

And with over 140 marathons and longer races to his credit 36-year-old Cavin Woodward of Learnington should know.

Tipped as hot favourite he cruised home in a time of two hours, 34 minutes, 42 seconds, over four minutes in front of the nearest contender Banbury Harrier Nigel Braggins.

But for 26-year-old Nigel of Stanwell Drive, Middleton Cheney, second place was

no small triumph.

As he crossed the finish line in Banbury's Market Place he became the first Oxford-

shire county champion.

Spurred on by a healthy rivalry with club-mates Geoff Doyley and Neil Moores he made a late challenge for the title only a few miles from home, overtaking his fellow Harriers who were battling in third and fourth places.

AMAZED

"They were going so quickly early on I thought there was no way I was going to catch them. I was amazed I closed the gap, said Nigel, who had run in only two other

marathons prior to the Banbury race.
Third-place Neil Moores of Milcombe, led
the field of 180 runners for at least half the course earning the praise of champion Woodward, a former winner of the 53-mile

London to Brighton race.

"I have great respect for Neil Moores," he said. "He pushed the pace well in the first half and at time I had a job to hang on to

"It was a tough course — not quite as bad as the Isle of Wight but probably second to that.'

The course was a punishing one and competitors had to content not only with some of the most notorious hills in the area but a biting cold wind, the runner's worst enemy.

The conditions even took their toll on the experienced. Shortly after the 20-mile mark Banbury Harrier Geoff Doyly, a front runner tipped to do well, had to pull out suffering from mild hypothermia.

He was taken by one of the many ambulances dotted along the route to a medical aid unit outside Banbury Town Hall to recover.

But despite the battle against the elements at the end of the day the computer showed an astounding success rate with 158 athletes out of 180 crossing the line, tired, cold and aching but elated.

Fifteen ladies took part and six completed the course, the first being 40-year-old Banbury Harrier Carole Vincent of Bloxham who was running her first marathon ever.

Carole, a part time library assistant at Banbury's North Oxfordshire Technical College,

came home 78th in a time of 3.42.36 to become the first lady Oxfordshire county champion.

LONGEST

The longest distance she had achieved prior to the race was a training run of 20 miles. "I hoped I would finish but I was not sure," she said. "I knew it would be tough but I did not expect it to be so windy."

The second lady across the line was Theodosia Burr of Wroxton in 91st place.

Another first timer was 43-year-old accountant Bob Turnbull of Oxford Road, Bodicote, the 75th runner to pass the post. Bodicote, the 75th runner to pass the post. His longest run prior to the race was just 13 miles though he had been training hard in preparation clocking up 35 miles a week. Like those before him he was cheered on by a large enthusiastic crowd of spectators who had gathered in the square.

"It felt really good as I crossed the line — a real achievement," he said.

The figure-of-eight course took th runners first towards the Northamptonshire border through Middleton Cheney, Upper Ward-

through Middleton Cheney, Upper Wardington and Chacombe, then back through Banbury on to Wroxton, Broughton and Bodicote and finally into the town centre again.

The race, organised by Banbury Harriers Athletic Club and the Lions Club of Banbury, cost around £2,000 to stage, money

provided by the sponsors, Albest Windows.
Throughout the race motorcycle outriders from Superbike House, Banbury, patrolled the course watching for any athletes who might run into difficulties and an army of 80 marshalls were on hand to give directions.

The police were also out in force and local schools and other organisations braved the cold to man seven feeding stations.

Graham Stephens, chairman of the organising, praised all those who had helped to make the operation a success and was delighted with the number of competitors who had completed the course.

"I thought the course was fairly undulating and I expected with the wind as it was that it

would really drain people.

"But more or less without exception the athletes said they found it a very enjoyable and interesting course. Some were quite a bit fed up with people for trying to produce flat, boring courses.

There were 64 people who entered but did not take part and Mr Stephens felt this was mainly due to the weather.

But plans were now in the pipeline to make the Banbury marathon an annual event following Sunday's success.


